A s avid boaters, Shawn Starwalt and Melinda Chern's dream came true when they purchased the Findlay Marina on April 1, 2021. Their purchase of the marina coincided with opening day, so they hit the ground running, tackling this new adventure together, and have never looked back.

Findlay Marina is located on the west side of Lake Shelbyville, about four minutes outside of Findlay, Illinois. One of the main aspects that Shawn and Mel focus on is their community, whether it be the boaters, their employees, or even the surrounding towns.

"The boating community is fantastic," Mel said. "It is such a tight-knit community. Everyone has everyone's back." The marina holds private events for their boating community each year during the season. These events allow everyone to get together and mingle regardless of what dock they are on. "We realized pretty quickly that people don't go to other docks besides their own. And we thought, why not figure out a way to get everyone together?" she

said. They have over 345 rental slips available. The marina also continues to offer food trucks, as well as a customer appreciation day.

Shawn and Mel consider their employees family and treat them as such. "We are all in

this together," commented Shawn. The marina has eight full-time employees, as well as seasonal workers. Three of the full-time employees

are on-site mechanics. They repair the slip renter's boats and off-thestreet boats. Other offerings include detailing, waxing, buffing, bottom painting, shrink wrapping, winterization, stereo installs, upholstery, pull in boats, delivery of boats, on-site dry storage, and off-site inside storage. "Most of the gas dock workers have grown up at the marina, so they absolutely love their jobs," Mel said. "If they get to work here as well as "play" here, then they are happy!"

Both Shawn and Mel are very passionate about doing things for the community, such as financial contributions, donation of boat rentals, and swag bags for fundraisers. They also help with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers fishing tournaments. They are

huge on helping veterans, such as through fishing tournaments. "It's the community. That is the 'why' behind everything," Shawn shared. Findlay Marina is open April 1-Nov. 1 for seasonal boaters. They offer 13 pontoon boats for rent, as well as a party barge that can hold up to 25 people, all of which are available to rent from the end of April to mid-October. The Ship Store offers alcohol and non-alcoholic beverages, ice, snacks, sandwiches, apparel, floats, oils, safety equipment for boats, minor parts, Morgan's meats, bait, and fishing supplies.

Shawn and Mel live at the marina on a boat seven months out of the year. They love where they work and the lifestyle that comes with it. Shawn, a native of Shelbyville, grew up going to the lake, so it is now a full-circle moment to own Findlay Marina. They jumped right into this venture together and haven't looked back since.
